Bible Reading: Acts 2:1-21 (NRSV)

The Coming of the Holy Spirit

2 When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place. ² And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. ³ Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. ⁴ All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability.

⁵ Now there were devout Jews from every nation under heaven living in Jerusalem. ⁶ And at this sound the crowd gathered and was bewildered, because each one heard them speaking in the native language of each. ⁷ Amazed and astonished, they asked, "Are not all these who are speaking Galileans? ⁸ And how is it that we hear, each of us, in our own native language? ⁹ Parthians, Medes, Elamites, and residents of Mesopotamia, Judea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, ¹⁰ Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya belonging to Cyrene, and visitors from Rome, both Jews and proselytes, ¹¹ Cretans and Arabs—in our own languages we hear them speaking about God's deeds of power." ¹² All were amazed and perplexed, saying to one another, "What does this mean?" ¹³ But others sneered and said, "They are filled with new wine."

¹⁴ But Peter, standing with the eleven, raised his voice and addressed them, "Men of Judea and all who live in Jerusalem, let this be known to you, and listen to what I say. ¹⁵ Indeed, these are not drunk, as you suppose, for it is only nine o'clock in the morning. ¹⁶ No, this is what was spoken through the prophet Joel:

17 'In the last days it will be, God declares, that I will pour out my Spirit upon all flesh, and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, and your young men shall see visions, and your old men shall dream dreams.
18 Even upon my slaves, both men and women, in those days I will pour out my Spirit; and they shall prophesy.
19 And I will show portents in the heaven above and signs on the earth below, blood, and fire, and smoky mist.
20 The sun shall be turned to darkness

before the coming of the Lord's great and glorious day.
²¹ Then everyone who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved.'

Reflection

The Jewish 'festival of weeks, the first fruits of the wheat harvest' (Exodus 34:22) was called Pentecost ('fiftieth') because it took place 50 days after the spring Passover festival (Leviticus 23:16). We note that Jesus observed the Passover with his disciples before his death (Luke 22:15) and the first Christians continued to observe the Pentecost (Acts 20:16; 1 Cor 16.8), which was celebrated on the fiftieth day of the season beginning on Easter Sunday. We also note that in the Gospel of Luke and the Acts of the Apostles, during Easter, Jesus ordered his disciples to wait in Jerusalem for 'the promise of the Father', that is, a baptism in the Spirit 'not many days from now' and Pentecost saw the fulfilment of this promise that they would be 'clothed with power from on high' (Luke 24:49; Acts 1:4,8; Acts 2).

By Jesus' time, Pentecost was a celebration of God's descending in the thunder and lightning that shook Mount Sinai (Exodus 19.16-19) to give the Law to Israel. The coming of the Spirit in Acts 2 'when the day of Pentecost had come' is about God's coming again with a power like that of wind and fire, but this time God is not giving the Law but giving the Spirit, as Hebrew prophets Joel and Jeremiah had foretold: 'I will put my law within them, and I will write it on their hearts; and I will be their God, and they shall be my people' (Jeremiah 31.33).

We read that the people from many nations who were in Jerusalem to celebrate Pentecost were 'devout' Jews. But we quickly discover that this is only part of a much bigger picture – actually, the universal nature of the gift of the Spirit is clearly anticipated both by the long list of nations they represent and by Joel's great vision: 'In the last days it will be, God declares, that I will pour out my Spirit on all flesh'.

I think our reading in Acts mostly draws our attention to the power of God in the 'sound like the rush of a violent wind' and the 'divided tongues as of fire'. And then there's an amazing linguistic event in which people with different languages from 'every nation under heaven' (that is, from across the known world), were, in that moment, hearing, and so surely understanding, the words of the Spirit filled disciples in their own language. What an amazing, empowering and extraordinarily uniting experience!

As we observe how on this special day, each one's native language is heard, and in Peter's preaching on Joel, that the young will see visions and the old will dream dreams, I like the way this strongly suggests to us that the Spirit gives different gifts and inspires different activities. This is very encouraging and empowering. As we seek to share and be good news to all people in our world today, with those who share our language and with those with other 'native languages', we wonder: How might the Spirit speak through us? What might the Spirit inspire us to do? What might the Spirit lead us to do to build bridges and foster unity within our community and beyond?
