### THE MINISTER WRITES ...



Dear All,

As we noted last month, it is good for us to think often and deeply about transformation. This is because transformation is central to any understanding of our Christian faith. In my May letter, we reflected on this present time of unusual and unexpected transformation for us and our world and we took a hopeful look to the future where perhaps, among other things, normal and even mundane aspects of life, which we used to take for granted, might become immensely

precious to us.

This month, I'd like us to focus on one particularly important aspect of transformation. Let's think about Jesus and his inaugural message as recorded by Mark, the first Gospel written: *"The time is fulfilled, and the Kingdom of God has come near; repent, and believe in the good news"* (Mark 1:14-15).

Many contemporary scholars agree that this is Mark's advance summary of what his 'good news' story of Jesus is all about. Here, 'the Kingdom of God' is all about the transformation of life here on earth. As we see in Jesus' entry into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday and, on the next day, Jesus' provocative act of overturning the tables in the temple in Jerusalem, (two actions that were pivotal in the eyes of the authorities), 'Jesus was proclaiming a kingdom, a way of life on earth, that challenged and countered their kingdom of exploitation and violence' (Marcus Borg). His challenging of those in authority because of the way they ruled the world, led to his death on a cross. Jesus lived and died loving others and working for a transformed world in a social, political and religious sense. He was passionate about a new way, God's way of living and loving and this just, loving and transformational way was emphatically rejected at the cross. He was passionate about the transformation of this world.

Whilst we long for our world to come through this difficult time, whilst we understandably long for a 'little bit of normal' to be restored into our own lives, we do *not* long for the world to 'return to normal.' Sonya Renee Taylor, an author, poet and social justice activist offers us these profound and prophetic words:

"We will not go back to normal. Normal never was. Our pre-corona existence was not normal other than we normalized greed, inequity, exhaustion, depletion, extraction, disconnection, confusion, rage, hoarding, hate and lack. We should not long to return, my friends. We are being given the opportunity to stitch a new garment. One that fits all of humanity and nature."

Inspired by Jesus' passion for a transformed world, let us be a prophetic people as we actively seek to live and work and pray for the much needed transformation of our world – social and economic justice, equality, peace and a nurtured creation.

# **ECO CHURCH - CREATION CARE - CLIMATE CHANGE AND CORONAVIRUS**

As time goes on, a number of parallels and connections are emerging between the world-wide coronavirus crisis and the climate change emergency. In the first place, with increasing globalisation, we cannot fail to be aware of the interconnectedness of all peoples and countries, with a new virus able to spread throughout the globe in a mere few months. Actions taken in one country can affect not just that country but those on the other side of the world, which is true both in the management of the virus and the climate. We are one world and both issues need co-operation at global level.

A sad fact is that the people most at risk from Covid-19, as well as the old, are turning out to be the poor. The same can be said to be true for the effects of climate change, with the poorest countries – who have done the least to cause global warming – suffering the worst from its effects. The inequalities in the world, and even within our own country, are only too obvious.

But could the causes of climate change also have something to do with the outbreak of the coronavirus? Well, it seems there might be a connection. It is becoming apparent that, in all sorts of ways, humankind has been taking too many liberties with the natural world, encroaching too far. We know that habitat loss caused by us is threatening the extinction of many species, but it also seems that, as we disrupt the ecological balance, the possibility of viruses passing from animals to humans increases. Two years ago, scientists predicted a new coronavirus would emerge from bats in Asia, partly because this was the area most affected by deforestation and other environmental pressures. South America, with the alarming destruction of the Amazon rainforest, is considered a similar risk.

There is complex science here and plenty of food for thought. In every way, it seems, it is Christian values which are needed more than ever to tackle these world-wide issues. Prayers for peace and justice have long been part of our thinking and we must continue to work for these at all levels. For co-operation rather than competition between countries, for economic justice and greater equality and for economic growth to be less important than health and well-being for us and our world.

# OVER THE GARDEN WALL

As I write, tomorrow is Ascension Day, 40 days from Easter, and still we are in lockdown, but there is hope of gradual release. Good news is that 25% of people say they have watched a streamed service and 44% say that they pray. We should thank the Lord for this. I hope the town centre churches, maybe along with Inspiring Ipswich will, once we are open again be looking how we can bring Christ to the town. We missed the Good Friday witness! The Eastertide Lectionary readings from Acts and John are so uplifting. Doc and I travelled along Paul's route for many miles; he is such an example to us.

Less good are the stories of bereavement. At a streamed Mass just now, I heard of an Ipswich man on a ventilator as his wife is expecting their first child. We all need to be praying for each other. I am blessed to be part of a group that all pray at the same time once each week, and it includes my Ugandan friends! In March, our second bishop of East Anglia, Archbishop Peter Smith died, and just last week was the funeral of Bishop Leo McCartie, ordained in 1949 then auxiliary bishop in Birmingham from 1977 and bishop of Northampton from 1990. I visited him in January and he was still in great form. He was probably the longest serving bishop in England and Wales since the Reformation and there were just 6 at his funeral Mass. On a lighter note, I wonder how long it is since St Pancras feast day was not celebrated with Pancras pie!!

As we approach Pentecost, I recall my childhood in Manchester and the Whit Walks. These huge events with Catholic, Anglican and then nonconformist Sunday Schools marching through the streets on successive Sundays were a great witness and big processions and bands thronged the city centre on Easter Monday and Friday. I remember hearing them as I sat my final exams!! Thinking of this, let us not forget all our young people whose GCSE, A level and University or college grades are being estimated this year and the year 10 and 12 youngsters who have missed valuable lessons. Let us pray for all our students that arrangements to restart formal learning can be made safely.

God bless you all and let's hope we soon meet again!
