Sunday Worship

Hello, I hope you and your loved ones are keeping well. This Sunday, we will focus on the assigned Gospel reading, Matthew 22:15-22. In this passage, religious leaders seek to entrap Jesus with a question about allegiance to the emperor and to God. Jesus then counters with a carefully worded answer: give to each what they are due. The leaders are amazed at his teaching and they leave him alone – for now.

A gathering prayer

Epistle Reading 1 Thessalonians 1:1-10 (NRSV)

Salutation

1 Paul, Silvanus, and Timothy,

To the church of the Thessalonians in God the Father and the Lord Jesus Christ: Grace to you and peace.

The Thessalonians' Faith and Example

² We always give thanks to God for all of you and mention you in our prayers, constantly ³ remembering before our God and Father your work of faith and labour of love and steadfastness of hope in our Lord Jesus Christ. ⁴ For we know, brothers and sisters ^[a] beloved by God, that he has chosen you, ⁵ because our message of the gospel came to you not in word only, but also in power and in the Holy Spirit and with full conviction; just as you know what kind of people we proved to be among you for your sake. ⁶ And you became imitators of us and of the Lord, for in spite of persecution you received the word with joy inspired by the Holy Spirit, ⁷ so that you became an example to all the believers in Macedonia and in Achaia. ⁸ For the word of the Lord has sounded forth from you not only in Macedonia and Achaia, but in every place where your faith in God has become known, so that we have no need to speak about it. ⁹ For the people of those regions ^[b] report about us what kind of welcome we had among you, and how you turned to God from idols, to serve a living and true God, ¹⁰ and to wait for his Son from heaven, whom he raised from the dead—Jesus, who rescues us from the wrath that is coming.

Gospel Reading Matthew 22:15-22 (NRSV)

The Question about Paying Taxes

¹⁵Then the Pharisees went and plotted to entrap him in what he said. ¹⁶So they sent their disciples to him, along with the Herodians, saying, 'Teacher, we know that you are sincere, and teach the way of God in accordance with truth, and show deference to no one; for you do not regard people with partiality. ¹⁷Tell us, then, what you think. Is it lawful to pay taxes to the emperor, or not?' ¹⁸ But Jesus, aware of their malice, said, 'Why are you putting me to the test, you hypocrites? ¹⁹ Show me the coin used for the tax.' And they brought him a denarius. ²⁰Then he said to them, 'Whose head is this, and whose title?' ²¹ They answered, 'The emperor's.' Then he said to them, 'Give therefore to the emperor the things that are the emperor's, and to God the things that are God's.' ²² When they heard this, they were amazed; and they left him and went away.

Reflection

In our Gospel reading today, we have what is the first of three conflict stories where the tensions between Jesus and various alliances of religious leaders intensifies. By the end of this chapter in Matthew, the situation is changed and no further dialogue is possible: 'no one was able to give him an answer, nor from that day did anyone dare to ask him any more questions' (22:46).

In this first test, it is the Pharisees who attempt to entangle Jesus in his speech. We note that this is described as a 'plot' and perhaps this reminds the reader of the plan to kill Jesus in Matthew 12:14 and certainly, it heightens the sense that Jesus is facing intense opposition here. The Pharisees try to trap him by firstly flattering Jesus as they pretend to be genuine and sincere in their motives and their method. Next, they ask him a question that they assume will present Jesus with the same sort of dilemma that he had inflicted upon the chief priests (Matthew 21:24-6):

²⁴ Jesus said to them, 'I will also ask you one question; if you tell me the answer, then I will also tell you by what authority I do these things. ²⁵ Did the baptism of John come from heaven, or was it of human origin?' And they argued with one another, 'If we say, "From heaven", he will say to us, "Why then did you not believe him?" ²⁶ But if we say, "Of human origin", we are afraid of the crowd; for all regard John as a prophet.'

Anyway, it is his turn now! Jesus must either lose favour with the many ordinary people who are fascinated by his message and ministry by supporting the oppressive taxation system of the Roman occupiers or he must suffer the indignation of the Herodians who were loyal to Herod and allies of Rome, by opposing it.

Of course, as ever, Jesus easily discerns their malice and their test. He asks for a Roman coin and he answers their question. As one commentator helpfully explains these 'coins were handheld billboards of imperial propaganda with busts of imperial figures and inscriptions. Jesus' clever answer avoids the 'either/or' answer his opponents were seeking.' Jesus is a person of integrity and he answers those of questionable character without fear. He supports the payment of Roman taxes for the exact same reason that he agrees to pay taxes to the corrupt Temple and urges his followers to travel an extra, second mile with one who forces them to go one mile (5:41). For Jesus, how just the tax is, is not the point. And I think his actual point might also speak to us. The point is that those who give to God their heart and soul and mind (22:37) are able to love even their enemies and to bless those who persecute them (5:44). They live with their hearts fixed on their treasure in heaven, they are not particularly concerned with the loss of money in this life and so they give Caesar his worthless coins and they give God everything that counts. Faithful, loyal, devoted, loving, serving hearts and souls and minds given to God and his kingdom of justice and peace are to be the focus of how we disciples live our lives. Amen.
