Opening sentence

Return to the Lord, your God,
who is gracious and merciful;

God is slow to anger

and abounding in steadfast love.

Psalm 51:1-17

Prayer for Cleansing and Pardon

- ¹ Have mercy on me, O God,
according to your steadfast love;
according to your abundant mercy
blot out my transgressions.
- ² Wash me thoroughly from my iniquity,
and cleanse me from my sin.
- ³ For I know my transgressions,
and my sin is ever before me.
- ⁴ Against you, you alone, have I sinned,
and done what is evil in your sight,
so that you are justified in your sentence
and blameless when you pass judgement.
- ⁵ Indeed, I was born guilty,
a sinner when my mother conceived me.
- ⁶ You desire truth in the inward being;
therefore teach me wisdom in my secret heart.
- ⁷ Purge me with hyssop, and I shall be clean;
wash me, and I shall be whiter than snow.
- ⁸ Let me hear joy and gladness;
let the bones that you have crushed rejoice.
- ⁹ Hide your face from my sins,
and blot out all my iniquities.
- ¹⁰ Create in me a clean heart, O God,
and put a new and right spirit within me.
- ¹¹ Do not cast me away from your presence,
and do not take your holy spirit from me.
- ¹² Restore to me the joy of your salvation,
and sustain in me a willing spirit.
- ¹³ Then I will teach transgressors your ways,
and sinners will return to you.
- ¹⁴ Deliver me from bloodshed, O God,
O God of my salvation,
and my tongue will sing aloud of your deliverance.
- ¹⁵ O Lord, open my lips,
and my mouth will declare your praise.
- ¹⁶ For you have no delight in sacrifice;
if I were to give a burnt-offering, you would not be pleased.
- ¹⁷ The sacrifice acceptable to God is a broken spirit;
a broken and contrite heart, O God, you will not despise.

Old Testament Reading - Isaiah 58:1-5

False and True Worship

58 Shout out, do not hold back!

Lift up your voice like a trumpet!
Announce to my people their rebellion,
to the house of Jacob their sins.

²Yet day after day they seek me
and delight to know my ways,
as if they were a nation that practised righteousness
and did not forsake the ordinance of their God;
they ask of me righteous judgements,
they delight to draw near to God.

³'Why do we fast, but you do not see?
Why humble ourselves, but you do not notice?'
Look, you serve your own interest on your fast-day,
and oppress all your workers.

⁴Look, you fast only to quarrel and to fight
and to strike with a wicked fist.

Such fasting as you do today
will not make your voice heard on high.

⁵Is such the fast that I choose,
a day to humble oneself?
Is it to bow down the head like a bulrush,
and to lie in sackcloth and ashes?

Will you call this a fast,
a day acceptable to the Lord?

Gospel Reading – Matthew 6:1-6

Concerning Almsgiving

6 'Beware of practising your piety before others in order to be seen by them; for then you have no reward from your Father in heaven.

²'So whenever you give alms, do not sound a trumpet before you, as the hypocrites do in the synagogues and in the streets, so that they may be praised by others. Truly I tell you, they have received their reward. ³But when you give alms, do not let your left hand know what your right hand is doing, ⁴so that your alms may be done in secret; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you.

Concerning Prayer

⁵ 'And whenever you pray, do not be like the hypocrites; for they love to stand and pray in the synagogues and at the street corners, so that they may be seen by others. Truly I tell you, they have received their reward. ⁶ But whenever you pray, go into your room and shut the door and pray to your Father who is in secret; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you.

We offer you other concerns we carry in our hearts:
(personal prayer)

Lord, in your mercy,
hear our prayer.

God our only hope,
 you seat us at the table with our enemies,
 breathing in our fears.
 Feed us from your mouth,
 that our bread may be to do your will,
 in the strength of your anointed,
 who taught us to pray:

***Our Father, who art in heaven,
 hallowed be thy name;
 thy kingdom come; thy will be done;
 on earth as it is in heaven.
 Give us this day our daily bread,
 and forgive us our trespasses,
 as we forgive those who trespass against us.
 Lead us not into temptation;
 but deliver us from evil.
 For thine is the kingdom,
 the power and the glory,
 for ever and ever. Amen***

Closing Prayer – A time of turning round

Truly dust we are, and to dust we shall return;
 and truly yours we are, and to you we shall return.
 Help this to be a time of turning round and beginning again.
 Through the forty days of lent, help us to follow you
 and to find you; in the discipline of praying
 and in the drudgery of caring –
 in whatever we deny ourselves,
 and whatever we set ourselves to learn or do.
 Help us to discover you
 in our loneliness and in community,
 in our emptiness and our fulfilment,
 in our sadness and our laughter.
 Help us to find you when we ourselves are lost.
 help us to follow you on the journey to Jerusalem
 to the waving palms of the people's hope,
 to their rejection, to the cross and empty tomb.
 Help us to perceive new growth amid the ashes of the old.
 Help us, carrying your cross, to be signs of your Kingdom. Amen
