Gospel Reading Luke 24:36b-48 (NRSV)

Jesus Appears to His Disciples

^{36b} Jesus himself stood among them and said to them, 'Peace be with you.' ³⁷ They were startled and terrified, and thought that they were seeing a ghost. ³⁸ He said to them, 'Why are you frightened, and why do doubts arise in your hearts? ³⁹ Look at my hands and my feet; see that it is I myself. Touch me and see; for a ghost does not have flesh and bones as you see that I have.' ⁴⁰ And when he had said this, he showed them his hands and his feet. ⁴¹ While in their joy they were disbelieving and still wondering, he said to them, 'Have you anything here to eat?' ⁴² They gave him a piece of broiled fish, ⁴³ and he took it and ate in their presence.

⁴⁴Then he said to them, 'These are my words that I spoke to you while I was still with you—that everything written about me in the law of Moses, the prophets, and the psalms must be fulfilled.' ⁴⁵Then he opened their minds to understand the scriptures, ⁴⁶ and he said to them, 'Thus it is written, that the Messiah is to suffer and to rise from the dead on the third day, ⁴⁷ and that repentance and forgiveness of sins is to be proclaimed in his name to all nations, beginning from Jerusalem. ⁴⁸You are witnesses of these things.'

Reflection

The two disciples have now returned to Jerusalem after their walk to Emmaus and back. Their conversation with Jesus on the Emmaus road has brought some comfort but may well have raised yet more questions. Luke follows his 'Emmaus road encounter' story with today's story, which he places on the evening of the first Easter Sunday. So, at this stage, the disciples have now heard the testimony of the women (24:8-11), a report of the two on their way to Emmaus (24:33, 35) and they know of an appearance to Peter (24:12, 34). Still, they are in emotional turmoil which no doubt includes shock and grief at Jesus' death, and confusion and disbelief regarding the disappearance of his body.

We then read that 'Jesus himself stood among them and said to them, 'Peace be with you.' As Jesus appears among them, they think he is a ghost (24:37) and at first, it proves rather difficult for them to be convinced otherwise! Despite all the accounts they have already heard, merely hearing such testimony is not sufficient to lead them to believe. In fact, even when Jesus has shown them his hands and feet and has eaten, revealing to them that he is not a ghost or a vision and that there is a continuity with his earthly body (24:39-42), it is still not enough to provoke their faith, despite their emotional response of joy (24:41). I find their state at this stage fascinating and remarkable! They are experiencing 'joy' (and what a wonderful joy they must have felt!) while 'disbelieving' and 'still wondering'. There was so much going on, so much to process, so much to consider. What wonderful joy they must have felt in this mysterious moment, this amazing encounter, even though fear and failing faith linger.

What changes this for the disciples? Well, the turning point in this story occurs when Jesus explains the Scriptures to them and they begin to understand who he is. It appears that for belief to happen, Jesus must interpret the Scriptures for them (24:44-47) just as he had done in the previous story which left the two disciples saying to one another "were not our hearts burning within us while he was talking to us on the road, while he was opening the scriptures to us?" (24:32). It appears that for Luke, as Methodist Minister and writer Michael Townsend astutely explains, 'the bare fact of the resurrection is not the most

important thing: what matters is what it means. Until Jesus has interpreted the meaning to the disciples, they neither understand nor fully believe. However, once they have understood it, they are commissioned to be witnesses both to the fact and to its meaning (24:48). If we gather for worship with attentive and open hearts and minds, listening for what the risen Christ says to us through the Scriptures, ...we too may discern his presence and become witnesses to these things in our day and generation.'

Let's be open to encounters with the risen Lord today and may we be blessed with the joy, wonderful joy that comes in his presence. Let's be attentive, open hearted and open minded as we worship, as we reflect upon the Scriptures and as we consider their meaning in their original context as well as what God may want to say to us today. And lastly, as we notice that the disciples experienced times of confusion and anxiety while on their journey of faith, let's find encouragement here, there's encouragement for each of us here, as well as a precious opportunity to explore how we respond, emotionally in different situations. What would help our minds to be open and reassured even when we feel emotional turmoil and confusion, and even disbelief? I pray that in such moments as these we would each find comfort in the words of Scripture and the peace which 'surpasses all understanding' (Phil 4:7) in the presence of the risen One. Amen.

Let us pray:

Jesus said to his disciples, 'Peace be with you' – they responded with turmoil.

Jesus said, 'Have you anything to eat?' – they served him fish.

Jesus opened their minds – they became his witnesses.

So, Lord, may we too find peace in your service, with opened minds and hearts on fire.

Lord, we pray.

We pray for all who grieve for the loss of loved ones, family or friends, near or far away. Especially those who are bereaved a long way from family who can't travel to be with them to offer comfort and support. In their loss, in their grief, in their solitude may they find a calm centre and be upheld by their faith, their friendship and their neighbours.

For the world and its people,

Lord, we pray.

We pray for those whose bodies are ravaged by pain and illness, by disfigurement and disability. For those fearful of treatment, those who have recently received medical care and for those waiting for treatment. For Irene Gale, who has been admitted to Colchester Hospital. For Phyllis Davies, currently in residential care, for Joan, Chikondi and all those among us with health concerns. For the world and its people,

Lord, we pray.

We pray for those of faith and those of no faith, for those with purpose and those with no purpose in life. For those who have a clear direction and those who flounder uncertain for life in all its complexities. For those whose mental health causes them pain, anguish, confusion and loneliness, for those who feel abandoned, unwanted, unloved and un-helped.

For the world and its people,

Lord, we pray.

For countries at war with other countries and within themselves, for their people who fear for their lives and stability, for those made homeless and jobless and offered nothing but an uncertain future. For those countries where violence comes all too easily to the fore and where it is hard to grasp the real reason behind it. Remembering countries at war where their people are damaged, isolated, abused, for Myanmar, Ethiopia, Mozambique and closer to home for the people of Ireland and Northern Ireland, for Catholics and Protestants, those of faith and those of none.

For the world and its people,

Lord, we pray.

For Christians trying to work out the best way to live out their lives, true to their faith, to the Gospel, to their calling. Trying in these days to do the best they can, pulled this way and that. Trying to look beyond the present to the future, beyond their immediate neighbourhood to the worldwide family, for we are all God's children. Help us to catch a wider more inclusive vision of the needs of the world and its people for unless we are all fed no one is satisfied, unless we are all inoculated no one is safe. We remember before you in pray the wonderful work of the Ipswich Fair Trade shop, now open again and pray your blessing upon this work, all staff and volunteers and for those in developing counties who will benefit from a fair and just reward for their endeavours.

For the world and its people,

Lord, we pray.

For countries with surging Covid cases, for those with poor infrastructure and resources, for countries with little PPE and no vaccines and no realistic prospect of national immunisation any time soon. For those engaged in trying to resolve such issues no matter what faith, colour, creed, it is their need that needs to be met along with providing sufficient food and housing, safety and stability. For the world and its people,

Lord, we pray.

For ourselves we pray that our ears may be used to hear the cries of the needy, that our eyes be used to see the needs around us, that our voices be used to speak up for the marginalised and the poor, that our hands be used to reach out in comfort and that our lives be used to improve the lives of others. Lord, we pray. Amen.
