All-age Sunday Worship with Holy Communion

Hello, I hope you are well. Today, in our all-age service of worship there is an opportunity for us all to share Holy Communion together. If you are worshipping at home and would like to participate, may I encourage you to prepare some bread and wine (or something similar) ready for this part of our worship. Our focus this morning will be on our Gospel Reading, Mark 7:24-37.

Let us worship God together:

Call to worship

Let us say to one another:
'Be strong. Do not fear. God, our God, is here with us.'
Come with your fears, your doubts, your anxiety.
Come just as you are.
You are welcome in the name of God,
Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

A prayer of approach

Lord God, we come to you in so many different ways.

We may jump for joy at being in your presence;
or we may shamble in,
weighed down by the cares of our world.

The Gentile woman,
overcome with worry about her daughter,
fell at your feet and pleaded with you.

The deaf man had the people of Decapolis to plead for his healing.

God of miracles, however we are feeling, we come to meet you, expectant and hopeful. Whether we are one or many, and whatever our situation in life, you welcome us, arms wide open – and we worship you, Lord God of all.

Welcoming God, we thank you that you invite us to worship you and to be together.
Sustain us with your presence, nourish us with your word and sacrament, strengthen us in your service and then send us out to live every day of our lives, in your name. Amen.

The Gentile woman and the deaf man opened their minds and hearts to Jesus. When we open our minds, God helps us to understand his ways. **We bless you, Lord.**

When we open our hearts, God sees deep within. He loves us and wants us to turn to him, even when we've done wrong.

We bless you, Lord.

God comes to us now and listens to us, loves us, and forgives us.
He makes us whole.
We bless you, Lord. Amen.

A prayer of praise and thanksgiving

Lord God of healing, we thank you for the different ways you answer our prayers. The Gentile woman wasn't frightened to answer you back – and you knew she was right.

Hear him, ye deaf; his praise, ye dumb, your loosened tongues employ; ye blind, behold your Saviour come; and leap, ye lame, for joy!

My gracious Master and my God, assist me to proclaim, to spread through all the earth abroad the honours of thy name.

A short talk with our children and young people

I will share a few words and a prayer about today's theme with our children and young people in the church sanctuary.

Old Testament Reading

Isaiah 35:4-7a

Say to those who are of a fearful heart, 'Be strong, do not fear! Here is your God. He will come with vengeance, with terrible recompense. He will come and save you.' ⁵Then the eyes of the blind shall be opened, and the ears of the deaf unstopped; ⁶then the lame shall leap like a deer, and the tongue of the speechless sing for joy. For waters shall break forth in the wilderness, and streams in the desert; ⁷the burning sand shall become a pool, and the thirsty ground springs of water; the haunt of jackals shall become a swamp, the grass shall become reeds and rushes.

Gospel Reading

Mark 7:24-37

The Syrophoenician Woman's Faith

²⁴ From there he set out and went away to the region of Tyre. He entered a house and did not want anyone to know he was there. Yet he could not escape notice, ²⁵ but a woman whose little daughter had an unclean spirit immediately heard about him, and she came and bowed down at his feet. ²⁶ Now the woman was a Gentile, of Syrophoenician origin. She begged him to cast the demon out of her daughter. ²⁷ He said to her, 'Let the children be fed first, for it is not fair to take the children's food and throw it to the dogs.' ²⁸ But she answered him, 'Sir, even the dogs under the table eat the children's crumbs.' ²⁹ Then he said to her, 'For saying that, you may go—the demon has left your daughter.' ³⁰ So she went home, found the child lying on the bed, and the demon gone.

Jesus Cures a Deaf Man

³¹Then he returned from the region of Tyre, and went by way of Sidon towards the Sea of Galilee, in the region of the Decapolis. ³²They brought to him a deaf man who had an impediment in his speech; and they begged him to lay his hand on him. ³³He took him aside in private, away from the crowd, and put his fingers into his ears, and he spat and touched his tongue. ³⁴Then looking up to heaven, he sighed and said to him, 'Ephphatha', that is, 'Be opened.' ³⁵ And immediately his ears were opened, his tongue was released, and he spoke plainly. ³⁶Then Jesus ordered them to tell no one; but the more he ordered them, the more zealously they proclaimed it. ³⁷They were astounded beyond measure, saying, 'He has done everything well; he even makes the deaf to hear and the mute to speak.'

Reflection

In our gospel reading today, we find that Jesus has travelled into the Gentile region of Tyre and Sidon after a period of ministry spent healing and teaching many in Jewish territory. Now he encounters Gentiles in need of healing. The people are full of hope and faith in Jesus' ability to heal and they bring the needs of a sick girl and a deaf man to Jesus. As we just heard, Jesus heals them and then continues on his journey, urging the crowds to keep quiet about what he has done. Really, this reading explores how 'outsiders' are included in our journey of faith. The Gentile woman and the disabled man are both people who were considered to be outsiders in Jesus' society. But there are no borders to God's love and welcome.

It's probably fair to say that the story of the woman's faith in Mark 7:24-30 is the key story in this section which began with the sending of the twelve in Mark 6. This story takes the ongoing debate between the Pharisees and Jesus (see Mark 7:1-23), beyond the actual boundary between Jews and Gentiles. It is also about 'bread', which is an ongoing metaphor about the twelve's grasp of who Jesus is and what he's doing (See 6:52; 7:1-5 - the Greek literally says 'eat bread'; 7:27-28; 8:1-21).

So now Jesus is in Gentile territory. We notice that he is still hoping to have a little rest and recuperation time with his disciples; this has been an aim since Mark 6:30! He is visited by a Greek woman from 'up north' who has clearly heard of Jesus and knows where to find him, and she comes begging for her daughter's healing. Jesus tells a brief parable about boundaries; the mealtime boundary between the family and their animals (7:27). She completes the parable: the animals get the leftovers which interestingly, is exactly what happened for the disciples after the feeding of the five thousand in Mark 6:43! Jesus is astonished! It's not her faith that Jesus commends but her word. She's worked out something that the disciples don't appear to have grasped yet: that, as one commentator writes, 'the boundary between God's reign and everywhere else is porous and all sorts of people can come in and out, including this Greek woman.' Obviously, she did also have faith. It was faith that sent her on the journey to seek Jesus out, and faith that kept her going on the journey back to see whether Jesus' word was true and her daughter had been healed. And as we heard, wonderfully, that faith was not disappointed (7:30). Having broken down the boundaries in private, Jesus now very publicly opens the floodgates and shares the blessings of God's kingdom with the Gentiles. Perhaps this healing is pretty ordinary, but its significance is extraordinary because the writer of Mark evokes Isaiah 35, a prophecy of the coming of God and his kingdom to the whole world and not just to Israel, even though Israel is the focus.

It is the openness of God's kingdom that is clearly the theme of today's gospel reading. If we think for just a moment about the story of the healed deaf man, we might wonder whether it is significant that Mark chooses to tell us the Aramaic, 'eph' pha-tha', that Jesus speaks. Did he do this so that it stands out? Might 'eph' pha-tha', 'be opened' be referring not just to this man's ears and mouth but also to the kingdom, now opened to Gentiles? All foods being declared clean by Jesus in the preceding passage now wonderfully expands into all people being declared clean. Jesus again tries to keep what he's doing quiet but, as is so often case, the good news spreads like wildfire throughout the whole region. The Jewish leaders might not grasp this, but now two Gentiles have joined him in his message: the boundaries are breaking down and all are welcome to come and experience God's reign.

So Mark's story tells us about two people who weren't welcome in Israel because they weren't Jewish and yet Jesus welcomed them. We might try and put ourselves in their shoes; the quick-witted woman able to finish Jesus' parable, or the deaf man excluded because he could neither hear nor speak properly. What did it mean to them to be welcomed into the kingdom Jesus proclaims? How do you think the disciples reacted to this? What lessons are there for us and for our church community? How does Mark's story help us in wrestling with issues of welcome and inclusion? How should we welcome and include those who are different or who feel they will not fit in our churches? Let us do all we can play our part in the boundary breaking kingdom of God, to see that all are offered a warm welcome here and that there is never any exclusion due to race, ethnicity, nationality, gender, sexuality, disability or for any other reason. Let us hear the cries of those who are too often and unjustly discriminated against and in God's name, let us be those who offer only a loving and liberating welcome to all. We stand ready to embody the borderless kingdom of God! Amen.
