## Christ the King Sunday Worship

Christ the King Sunday this year brings before us readings from Daniel 7, Revelation 1 and John 18:33-37.

#### Call to worship

## Gospel Reading John 18:33-37

<sup>33</sup> Then Pilate entered the headquarters again, summoned Jesus, and asked him, 'Are you the King of the Jews?' <sup>34</sup> Jesus answered, 'Do you ask this on your own, or did others tell you about me?' <sup>35</sup> Pilate replied, 'I am not a Jew, am I? Your own nation and the chief priests have handed you over to me. What have you done?' <sup>36</sup> Jesus answered, 'My kingdom is not from this world. If my kingdom were from this world, my followers would be fighting to keep me from being handed over to the Jews. But as it is, my kingdom is not from here.' <sup>37</sup> Pilate asked him, 'So you are a king?' Jesus answered, 'You say that I am a king. For this I was born, and for this I came into the world, to testify to the truth. Everyone who belongs to the truth listens to my voice.'

## Reflection

In our reading from John's Gospel this morning, we hear about events that take place on the morning after Jesus was arrested. He has been put on trial by the religious leaders and now he is brought before the Roman procurator, Pilate. As we listen to the story and hear Jesus and Pilate's conversation, we notice a stark contrast between Pilate's understanding of kingship and authority and Jesus'. For Pilate, this is about rules and power; for Jesus it is about truth and community. We find Jesus making it clear why he is here. He has come to make the truth known.

I'm sure we all enjoy reading the fourth Gospel. For good reason, it may well be a favourite for some of us. For many years, it was the Gospel I would most often read. This Gospel, written 20-30 years after Mark, in the late first-century reads like a play, with characters entering scenes, signs being performed, and dialogue or dramatic speeches engaged in, before the writer moves the action on to the next scene. In the middle of this drama, the truth that Jesus embodies emerges. This context and content relates directly to today's reading and in the tense dialogue of this week's passage, the particular truth that emerges is about the identity of Jesus, his kingdom and the nature of truth itself.

In John 18:37, we find an intriguing reflection on the birth of Jesus: <sup>37</sup> Pilate asked him, 'So you are a king?' Jesus answered, 'You say that I am a king. For this I was born, and for this I came into the world, to testify to the truth'. In keeping with the prologue to John's Gospel ('In the beginning was the word...'), Jesus' origins are presented by this Gospel writer as being beyond this world. 'I came into the world' speaks of heavenly origins rather than the natural processes of childbirth. The message here is that the truth Jesus embodies is the truth of the eternal kingdom of God, which, while experienced in the world, does not originate in it and is not bound by it either. The truth that Jesus testifies to transcends the confines of time and culture. And the gospel's first readers would no doubt have noticed how this is in clear contrast to the cultural and political truth of the Roman Empire, which is represented in this scene by Pilate.

The passage ends with Jesus saying that 'everyone who belongs to the truth listens to my voice.' What does this remind us of? Well, we hear in these words clear echoes of at least two of the great 'I am' sayings of Jesus in John's Gospel: 'I am the way and the truth and the life' (John 14:6); and 'I am the good shepherd' (John 10:11) whose sheep 'listen to [his] voice' (10:16). To belong to Jesus is to listen to him, to follow his direction, to follow in his way and to discover and to live by the kingdom truth he embodies.

All this talk of truth, does, of course, leave us asking, as Pilate did, what is truth? And I'm sorry but I'm not sure I would be able to offer a simple and succinct solution to this important and enduring question! As we know, it is now as it has ever been! It means different things to different people: thinking of recent events, we could mention the Brexit bus, or the US elections in 2020 as two clear examples that show this is so. Others may quickly come to mind for you. We also read in this Gospel that Jesus is *'the way, the truth and the life'* and as those who are amazed by the particular way that Jesus reveals God to us, we will remain deeply committed to learning to listen to his voice in all that we think, say and do. For sure, there are other ways of knowing God, of encountering God, but for us as Christians there is something particularly special, distinctive and unique in the way that we know God through Jesus. We see best what God is like through him and we seek to faithfully follow Jesus, *'the way'*. Jesus is *'the way'* that we gladly choose to journey, in order to know God, to serve God, to love God and make his love known.

We may wish to consider how might we discover truth? How do we listen to the voice of Jesus? Sometimes, though this is certainly not for everyone, truth can come in the form of a dramatic revelation, perhaps through a dream as happened to Daniel, or a moment of vision like that of John in Revelation. It is probably more common for us to hear the Lord speaking to us through our reading and reflecting on the Scriptures. In John's Gospel, Jesus is presented as embodying the truth. In the synoptic Gospels, truth is discovered in community: Jesus facilitates conversations out of which truth emerges. As Christ's body on earth today, we the Church are called to embody and make known the truth of Jesus, who reveals the God who is love and who beckons us follow along in his way. Often, we discover Christ's truth and discern Christ's voice through what seem, or start out as, just our ordinary conversations. At all times and in all places, we remain open to learning about God, ourselves and our divine calling to share the truth of God's love with all of creation. May we know the truth of who we are and to whom we belong through Jesus and may we find this truth enormously empowering. Today, as we celebrate this truth on the festival of Christ the King, may this knowledge strengthen us whatever challenges we are facing. Amen.
