Gospel Reading John 5:1-9

Jesus Heals on the Sabbath

5 After this there was a festival of the Jews, and Jesus went up to Jerusalem.

² Now in Jerusalem by the Sheep Gate there is a pool, called in Hebrew Beth-zatha, which has five porticoes. ³ In these lay many invalids—blind, lame, and paralysed. ⁵ One man was there who had been ill for thirty-eight years. ⁶ When Jesus saw him lying there and knew that he had been there a long time, he said to him, 'Do you want to be made well?' ⁷ The sick man answered him, 'Sir, I have no one to put me into the pool when the water is stirred up; and while I am making my way, someone else steps down ahead of me.' ⁸ Jesus said to him, 'Stand up, take your mat and walk.' ⁹ At once the man was made well, and he took up his mat and began to walk.

New Testament Reading Revelation 21:10-14, 21:22-22:5

Vision of the New Jerusalem

¹⁰ And in the spirit he carried me away to a great, high mountain and showed me the holy city Jerusalem coming down out of heaven from God. ¹¹ It has the glory of God and a radiance like a very rare jewel, like jasper, clear as crystal. ¹² It has a great, high wall with twelve gates, and at the gates twelve angels, and on the gates are inscribed the names of the twelve tribes of the Israelites; ¹³ on the east three gates, on the north three gates, on the south three gates, and on the west three gates. ¹⁴ And the wall of the city has twelve foundations, and on them are the twelve names of the twelve apostles of the Lamb.

²² I saw no temple in the city, for its temple is the Lord God the Almighty and the Lamb. ²³ And the city has no need of sun or moon to shine on it, for the glory of God is its light, and its lamp is the Lamb. ²⁴ The nations will walk by its light, and the kings of the earth will bring their glory into it. ²⁵ Its gates will never be shut by day—and there will be no night there. ²⁶ People will bring into it the glory and the honour of the nations. ²⁷ But nothing unclean will enter it, nor anyone who practises abomination or falsehood, but only those who are written in the Lamb's book of life.

The River of Life

22 Then the angel showed me the river of the water of life, bright as crystal, flowing from the throne of God and of the Lamb ² through the middle of the street of the city. On either side of the river is the tree of life with its twelve kinds of fruit, producing its fruit each month; and the leaves of the tree are for the healing of the nations. ³ Nothing accursed will be found there any more. But the throne of God and of the Lamb will be in it, and his servants will worship him; ⁴ they will see his face, and his name will be on their foreheads. ⁵ And there will be no more night; they need no light of lamp or sun, for the Lord God will be their light, and they will reign for ever and ever.

Reflection

In today's assigned reading from the Book of Revelation, we have before us John's vision of hope and healing for the world. He sees God and Jesus form the Temple in the new Jerusalem, and they are the light of the world. John sees the water of life flowing clear and bright like crystal, and the tree of life bearing fruit that will bring healing to all nations. Together the tree, water and light give life to all things – a hopeful picture of the future for all humanity and all God's creation.

Let's take a closer look at this final vision in Revelation. Here, John sees in great detail the new Jerusalem that has already been mentioned briefly early on in Revelation 21:2. The lectionary leaves out the lengthy description of the physical substance of the city (including its dimensions, the gates, the materials used), but I've included some of these verses within our reading and hopefully this gives us a sense of the details John discussed. I think that the details we just heard, along with those not read today, that is verses 15-21 which speak of the measurements and many precious jewels used in the elaborate building of the city, all contribute to the overall sense of the unbelievable extravagance that is at the heart of this passage: what awaits God's people includes every hope imagined and many that are beyond imagining.

Of course, what we find here is, as we find throughout the whole Book of Revelation, that John draws heavily on the Hebrew Bible and on the apocalyptic traditions and so the story is overflowing with allusions to these earlier writings. The Genesis traditions about Eden (Gen. 2:4–14) and its restoration (1 Enoch 25:1–7; 2 Enoch 8:1–8), and the prophetic traditions about the restoration of Jerusalem (Zech. 14:11; Tobit 14:4–7; 4 Ezra 8:52; 1 Enoch 90:28–42) are particularly important for today's reading. As with almost every part of Revelation, there is, unsurprisingly, a lot of disagreement about the level of influence any of these traditions had and to what extent John conformed to or developed the thinking found within the tradition. However useful such deliberations may well be in the search to understand the text, I think what remains most important for us to recognise is that however strange the language of Revelation sounds to us as contemporary readers, John the apocalyptist is using language that would have made a lot of sense to his intended audience. John and his first readers were highly likely to have been Jewish Christians living in exile following the destruction of the Jerusalem Temple, and so by drawing on these well-established and well-known traditions, his words would have brought much comfort and hope.

We notice that the specific portion of the vision that's expressed in our reading highlights the all-inclusive nature of the blessings provided by this new Jerusalem. As we heard, in 21:22-27, a number of those blessings are expressed in terms of the safety or security of the people. Amazingly, this city needs no sun or moon, for 'the glory of God is its light, and its lamp is the Lamb' (21:23). The same promise is repeated in 22:5. Now, whether God and the Lamb replace the sun and moon or outshine them is beside the point. The key message is that there will always be light. The inhabitants of this city won't need to worry anymore about whether there's enough light. There will always be light for all of them as they live their lives. Maybe the most remarkable promise regarding security comes in 21:25: the gates of this city 'will never be shut by day and there will be no night there.' This is amazing! Anyone can come and go at any time, and no one needs to feel threatened or insecure. People from the nations will come in, and they will all be welcome (21:26). This would have sounded incredibly welcoming to the first readers, and indeed just as it does to us today. Within this setting of divine light and safety, people from every nation will live in harmony. Only in 22:2 is the 'healing of the nations' spoken of directly, but the references to the 'nations' and 'kings' in 21:24 already indicate that the community envisaged is fully inclusive. People from all over will bring to it 'the glory and the honour of the nations' (21:26). Now I know that focussing on the diversity of this population in this vision introduces a very contemporary issue, but I think it is a justifiable emphasis on this picture of a city in which diversity and unity have found balance. We contemplate our own calling to be a diverse, inclusive, welcoming people who reveal a radical love for our neighbour in all that we do, in all that we are as community. We long for, pray for our nation, our world to be a place of divine light and safety, of glory and honour for all people.

There is more for us to discover here as beyond these physical characteristics of the city, we find the precious promise of God's presence. Several times in Revelation, John has anticipated the presence of God with God's people (eg. 7:15-17; 21:3-4). Here, that message is stated again and with power! We read that the new Jerusalem needs no temple because the city itself has become the dwelling place of God. Most important, God's presence with God's people here becomes not only continual worship (22:3) but the very gift of actually seeing the face of God. As many of us will be aware, in the Biblical tradition no human being can look at God's face (Exodus 33:12-23; John 1:18). But also within this tradition is the hope of God's people being in God's presence and seeing God's face (eg. Psalm 17:15, Matthew 5:8). Here John anticipates the fulfilment of that deepest longing, the gift of seeing God's face, living in God's presence, and thriving on that presence. As those who live in God, who live in the love and life of God today, may we be assured of the nearness of God, the grace of God, the goodness of God. May we all, everyone of us sense the welcome and embrace of God. Of course, we will gladly celebrate the loving welcome God gives to Violet very shortly. But this welcome and embrace is for us all and it is in God that we find fresh inspiration to thrive as people, and to do all we can to help others thrive.

We heard this passage ending with a reference to power: God and God's people 'will reign forever and ever' (22:5). Given the destructive power of Rome that would have been all too familiar to the first readers of Revelation, it may seem surprising that John concludes with reference to God's power, especially given that the opposing powers to Rome have all been destroyed. However, the power envisaged here, just as with the power inherent in the 'river of the water of life' (22:1) and in the 'tree of life' (22:2), is the power to give and sustain life. In fact, this whole vision of the new city is pulsing with health and life, isn't it, with this crystal clear river filled with the water of life and the tree of life for the healing of the nations. We see that Scripture ends as it began, with harmony among humans and creation and a tree in the midst of it all. And certainly, with regards to power, well, death has lost all power! Sin is nowhere! And people and the rest of creation exist together in the overwhelming peace of God the Creator. Sadly, this is almost the exact opposite of what we hear daily about creation in new reports about the climate crisis. It could be tempting to lose all hope that there is any beauty in our future and that of our world. Perhaps this ancient vision of a New Jerusalem, which, it is vital to note, takes place on the earth and not in some distant ethereal place, might inspire us, might give us hope and encourage us in our work and prayers for the environment. How will we use our God given power to give and sustain life?

Now, as I draw to a close, as we may well know, there have been some very bad interpretations of extravagant passages like the one before us today as people have endeavoured to identify each item in the reading with a particular expectation about life in a heavenly city. But this kind of view actually ruins the reading where the vision promises some gifts that are beyond imagining or describing. And fundamentally, this book, this passage was about hope in this life. It was written for Christians facing persecution and hardship, and its powerful imagery was shaped to encourage them to hang on to the promise that, in the end, light will triumph

over darkness, hope over despair, and all people, nations, and indeed all of creation, will be healed and made whole: truly 'all shall be well'. While this may seem far removed from our own world, there is much in our lives and in the world where God's hope and healing are needed. Today, we offer ourselves afresh to God, asking that he might use us as agents of hope and healing in a hurting world. Amen.

A moment for reflection

We pray for those in the news, whose lives are playing out before the eyes of the world; we pray for journalists to be protected; for truth to be upheld; for integrity to be the mark of all in public office and positions of influence.
