## WHAT IS FUELLING US IN LIFE?

This has been adapted from an article originally written during the fuel shortage. However, with prices so high nowadays, this theme is still very topical 'fuel for thought'.

In spite of the environmental warning about the overuse of fossil fuels we are still completely fuel-dependent. As I have thought about this, I have been wondering what fuels us as people and whether or not our supply is plentiful?



#### What is fuelling us in life?

Jesus is the bread of life (John 6.35) and the Holy Spirit is given to us as living water (John 7.39). God's presence can empower us and give us renewed strength (Isaiah 40.31) and rest (Psalm 62.1). With all of this on offer, why are there times in our lives when we try to live and serve God in our own strength?

Encouragement can give us a fuel for life Encouragement is something we can give freely, whether it is us sharing stories of what God is doing, getting in touch with someone or offering to help someone in need. Who can we encourage today?

Love and Kindness and are essential for life. In a world that can be harsh, abrupt and where things are often done in a transactional way, actions that are loving and kind are a wonderful breath of fresh air. Several years ago, our family life was such a struggle that the church I was serving agreed that my hours should be capped at a maximum of 40 hours a week. One of the strange things that happened when I slowed down was that I became more productive because I was often working from a place of rest rather than a place of exhaustion. How can we prioritise rest and self-care? How can we encourage others to do the same?

Friendships and relationships are also essential. We were created for community and we need to ensure that we are not isolated and alone. How are you making time in life to meet with others?

All of these different 'fuels' are things that we have and that we can chose to share with others. Will we be spiritual tankers offering to others what we have freely received from God?

#### **ECO-CHURCH CREATION CARE**

"Carbon Bombs"

As I write this, the news on just one day includes the following.

- Significant sea level rise is now inevitable, with sea levels around the English coast forecast to be 35cm higher by 2050, resulting in maybe 200,000 homes having to be abandoned.
- New data has revealed extraordinary rates of global heating in the North Barents Sea, an area of the Arctic, up to 7 times faster than the global average. The loss of sea ice, good at reflecting sunlight, allows the darker ocean to absorb more energy and also means it no longer limits the warming of the Arctic air. The more ice is lost, the more heat accumulates, forming a feedback loop.
- In India as a whole, March was the hottest ever recorded, with scorching summer temperatures arriving two months early. In Pakistan's Balochistan region, temperatures have, over several weeks, repeatedly hit almost 50°C. (Will such a region continue to be habitable?) This intense and prolonged heatwave is having a devastating effect on this year's wheat and fruit crops.
- In the USA, Yellowstone National Park was forced to close after record levels of rainfall caused major flooding, washing away sections of road.

In the face of all the evidence of damaging climate change, it is extraordinary to learn that the major oil and gas companies continue to plan massive new projects whose carbon emissions would wreck any prospect of keeping global warming to 1.5 degrees. Over 5 months and following on from the pledges made at COP26, a global team of Guardian environment reporters has worked with leading thinktanks, analysts and academics across the world and identified no less than 195 of these so called "carbon bombs", each of which would result in at least a billion tonnes of CO<sub>2</sub> emissions over their lifetimes, in total equivalent to about 18 years of current global CO<sub>2</sub> emissions. Twenty-two mega-projects in the US account for more than a fifth of these potential emissions.

The better news is that a coalition of environmental lawyers, investigative journalists and campaigners has launched a group to challenge the "carbon bomb" fossil fuel projects revealed in this investigation. After a meeting in May, more than 70 NGOs and activist groups from around the world have formed a "carbon bomb defusal" network to share expertise and resources in the fight to halt the projects and prevent the catastrophic climate breakdown they would cause. But they have much to do to challenge some very powerful organisations and vested interests.

Prof Kevin Anderson, from the Tyndall Centre of Climate Research, University of Manchester and Uppsala University, Sweden, said, "Either the scientists have spent 30 years working on this issue and have got it all wrong – the big oil CEOs know better; or, behind a veil of concern, they have complete disregard for the more climate vulnerable communities, typically poor, people of colour and far away from their lives. Equally worrying, they are disinterested in their own children's future."

The shift from burning oil and gas cannot happen overnight, and a declining amount will still need to be burned during the transition to a net zero emissions global economy in 2050. But we have to question whether companies and governments are acting with any sense of urgency or real concern for our future and that of God's creation as a whole.

#### **OVER THE GARDEN WALL**

... from our neighbours at St Pancras



Dear Friends,

At St Pancras, just like Christ Church, we are slowly getting back to normal after the pandemic, though numbers are still not back to what they were before the coronavirus pandemic. As Comment goes to press, we are preparing for about 18 of the parish's children to make their First Communion, when they receive the Eucharist for the first time. We also recently had our bishop, the Rt Rev Alan Hopes, visit to carry out Confirmations. He is now 78 and awaiting the appointment of his successor, having been Bishop of East Anglia since 2013.

Pope Francis, 85, was recently in the news amid speculation that he might be following the example of his immediate predecessor and resigning. Francis did have to delay a trip to Africa because of knee problems, which have led to him using a wheelchair, but retirement seems unlikely. Apart from anything else, we Catholics are only just about getting used to two Popes being alive: three might be a step too far.

While there may, arguably, be an excess of popes, there does seem to be a shortage of priests. The Sunday Times reported in 2019 that the average age of Catholic priests in England and Wales was 65 and that only 25 were ordained in 2017, compared with 480 in the Church of England, which had a comparable number of worshippers. Our celibate Catholic priests do not have the support that most of us take for granted from our spouses. And it seems to be becoming less common for new priests to have the opportunity to work alongside more experienced colleagues in a parish to learn the ropes and benefit from their insight and experience.

We are blessed in St Pancras in having a relatively young priest in charge of the parish. And, compared with global statistics on the number of priests per Catholic, we in England have little to complain about. However, there were plans circulated a few years ago to reduce the number of parishes in Ipswich, cutting them from five to three.

We will all be praying when those children make their First Communion that it is not their last, that they grow up to play adult roles in the Church - and that our Lord sends labourers into the harvest.
